level to create extra floorspace – that way we could have a much grander kitchen and dining area.'

Once detailed plans had been drawn up, work got underway. Although the main house hadn't required much in the way of structural work, it was a different matter for the duckbarn. The building was completely derelict save for a family of nesting mallard ducks,'

remembers Leonard, an investment banker. 'The roof leaked in several places and there was ivy growing through the windows – hardly an inspiring sight.'

A new roof was erected, walls rebuilt, damp-proofing installed and floors put in. Because the house is in a conservation area, the couple weren't allowed to change the barn's exterior, but inside they had carte

blanche. Their first decision was to cover the vaulted roof, designed in an inverted ship shape, with tongue-and-groove beech boarding. 'A low-maintenance finish was important to us. We didn't want anything we'd have to paint too often,' says Carol.
